# Programs and Services Report

## Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2018

Since its founding in 1972, People's Place has helped tens of thousands of children and adults in Kent, Sussex, and New Castle Counties find their path to growth and independence. Last year 8,299 individuals benefited from our services. The following programs and services represent the depth and scope of the mission of People's Place—to help children and adults reach their fullest potential as individuals.

- 1. Counseling Centers**—provided services to 4,998 children and adults and 33,498 units of service at its four locations in Milford, Millsboro, Seaford, and Smyrna.
- 2. SAFE Program** (includes two shelters in Kent and Sussex Counties)—helped 397 victims, including children, answered 1,050 hotline calls, and provided 7,306 nights of shelter.
- 3. Abriendo Puertas Program** (shelter in Sussex County)—helped 95 victims, including children, answered 88 hotline calls, and provided 1,814 nights of shelter.
- 4. Turning Point Program**—served 222 adult survivors of domestic violence through counseling and support, 71 children through counseling and support, intervention for 552 domestic and family violence offenders, and 83 parents in separating and divorcing parent education.
- 5. Family Visitation Centers**—supervised 3,233 visits and child exchanges for 159 families.
- 6. Center for Community Justice**—served 993 individuals.
- 7. Group Home for Girls Program**—served 9 girls during the year.
- 8. Independent Living Program**—helped 146 young adults in foster care learn independent living skills.
- 9. Veterans Outreach Program**— 34 new veterans served.
- 10. Whatcoat Social Services Program**—sheltered 540 adults and children and provided 11,640 nights of shelter.
